South Bank's Festival of Britain 60 years on

This Summer Southbank Centre will host a four-month celebration of the 60th anniversary of the 1951 Festival of Britain.

The celebrations will be the centre's most ambitious cross-site festival with events indoors and outdoors as well as differently themed weekends throughout the four-month run. The line-up includes classical, jazz, folk and pop music, contemporary and ballroom dance, choirs from all traditions, performance poetry, visual art, DJs and debates as well as free performances and events.

The summer programme will feature an eclectic mix of contemporary British cultural talent, reflecting the history of Britain and the history of the site, which began in 1951 when the Royal Festival Hall was built as part of the South Bank exhibition, the main site of the 1951 festival.

Further details of the programme will be announced this month.



FESTIVAL WALLPAPER

The newly released 'Festival' wallpaper by Mini Moderns is a personal exhibition of the South Bank exhibition.

The design features highlights of the 1951 exhibition. Geometric shapes interplay with abstract representations of the Skylon, the Dome of Discovery and the Royal Festival Hall. Its linear forms reflect the modernist architectural vision of structures specially commissioned for the festival such as the Transport Pavilion and The Lion and the Unicorn Pavilion.

"We've been collecting Festival of Britain memorabilia for over 20 years," explain creative directors Keith Stephenson and Mark Hampshire.

"The 60th anniversary offered us the perfect opportunity to create a very personal homage to a piece of Britain's design history that has had such a strong creative influence on the Mini Moderns style".

BOOK REVIEW

This year 2011 is the 60th anniversary of the Festival of Britain when the focus of the post war celebration was on the newly cleared South Bank so Trevor May's *Great Exhibitions* paperback in the excellent Shire series is well-timed.

He first looks at the preceding 1851 Great Exhibition in Hyde Park, the White City exhibition on the 50th anniversary and the British Empire Exhibition at Wembley in the 1920s.

The Festival of Britain started out as a centenary commemoration of Prince Albert's Great Exhibition but with the Second World War just over it was called 'A tonic to the the nation'. Crowds came to see the Dome of Discovery which was the largest dome in the world when built on today's Jubilee Gardens. It was minimalist with fewer exhibits than the Great Exhibition's glass house. But the captions were written by Laurie Lee.

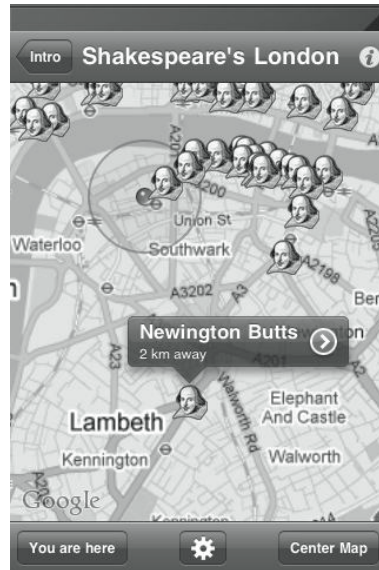
The total attendance figure for the site was over 8.5 million. Crowds poured into Waterloo visiting the specially built shops on the bus station site and St John's which had been restored as the Festival of Britain church. Many came on the bus using London Transport's souvenir bus tickets.

The Royal Festival Hall lives on as the core of an arts complex. The Festival's Telekinema became the National Film Theatre, the precursor to today's BFI Southbank. With George VI's sudden death the following year, the plan for the rest of the site was to make it a Coronation Garden. This was only realised in 1977 with the Jubilee Gardens.

IPHONE APP REVIEW

Shakespeare's London

Former *Guardian* journalist Victor Keegan has published a new iPhone app which uses geolocation to highlight the locations around London which have associations with the Bard.

As you might imagine many of the markers are in SE1. This well-researched app looks beyond the obvious sites such as the Globe and Rose playhouses to include locations such as Paris Garden to the west of Blackfriars Road and the theatre where Shakespeare's men performed at Newington Butts.

Southwark Cathedral gets a good write-up for its associations with Shakespeare and his brother, as well as other literary figures such as John Gower and John Fletcher.

The Falcon Inn in Hopton Street is also highlighted.

The app includes a link to an audio interview with archaeologist Julian Bowsher, co-author of the award-winning book *The Rose and The Globe: Playhouses of Shakespeare's Bankside* who describes what Bankside was like in 1600. It's a shame that the audio isn't better integrated with the rest of the app.

Victor Keegan, best known for his long-running technology column in *The Guardian*, now specialises in creative uses of new technology in partnership with developer Keith Moon of Data Ninjitsu.

Their previous apps include *City Poems*, linking classic poems about London to the streets and buildings that inspired them, and *Geo Poems* which contains all three of Victor Keegan's books of poems geo-tagged to the places that triggered them. Android versions are planned.
