More residential development for Bankside RICHARD ROGERS BUILDING TO REPLACE INDUSTRIAL ESTATE

A PLAN for up to several hundred flats behind Tate Modern is to be considered by Southwark Council later this year.

Land Securities plan to replace the low-rise industrial estate in Holland Street with a residential development designed by Richard Rogers. The Southwark Street frontage could have a six-storey block. Concern has already been raised about the effect on the 250 year old Hopton's Almshouses.

Neil Southard from Richard Rogers Partnership refused to confirm details of the plan, known as Bankside 4, when he met members of the Bankside Residents Forum. However, he did indicate that Lord Rogers was interested in opening up a view to the Thames

and City from Southwark Street. The ground floor is to have space for shops and bars. He conceded that the developers might be obliged to include some "affordable housing".

Most controversial is a plan to include car parking in the development. Existing Bankside residents have campaigned for a reduction of traffic in the area and Tate Modern has always avoided encouraging visitors to arrive by road.

Kate Adie opens tourism centre

TERRORISM threats should not stop us from enjoying ourselves and visiting places said broadcaster Kate Adie at the opening of Southwark's new Tourist Information Centre at Vinopolis.

Kate Adie, who is author of *Corsets to Camouflage* which accompanies the Imperial War Museum's current Women and War exhibition, recalled that during both World Wars residents of Southwark and their children chose to stay in the capital which was their home.

The centre has been funded by the London Development Agency with Vinopolis giving space at a low rent for a year. A permanent site for the centre is being sought near the Millennium Bridge.

Potters Fields: Southwark Council v Berkeley Homes

SOUTHWARK Council has approved a planning brief outlining its ambition to create a major cultural attraction on the Potters Fields coach park site next to Tower Bridge, in spite of Berkeley Homes' plan for eight high-rise residential towers.

The brief also specifies that the grade II listed Lambeth College building on Tooley Street should be retained as a community

facility, a designation that could see it developed in future years as a library, arts centre or for an educational use such as a school.

"As the last remaining developable site along the central belt of the Thames, Potters Fields has huge potential" says council leader Nick Stanton. "This planning brief will ensure that Potters Fields serves as the location for an outstanding building, benefiting local people,

Londoners and overseas visitors."

Last year Southwark turned down a planning application from Berkeley Homes for a development of eight cylindrical towers on the site. The developer is appealing against the decision and an inquiry will open on 28 April at Bankside House. Berkeley Homes' plans are vigorously opposed by many local residents.

Historic organ set to leave SE1**THE** Wurlitzer organ is expected to be dismantled and removed from the Edric Hall in Borough Road next month.

The giant organ, once part of the Trocadero in the Old Kent Road, is having to make way for the London South Bank University's expansion plans. The concert on Sunday 18 April will almost certainly be last of many Sunday afternoon demonstrations of the organ.

The University is seeking to expand its media and the performing arts facilities and has applied for grant funding to redevelop the Edric Hall as a multi-purpose performing arts complex. This year the South Bank Wurlitzer would have celebrated the 25th anniversary of its arrival at the Edric Hall.

Tower Bridge barges: inquiry adjourned

THE inquiry into the eviction notice served on residents of the Downings Roads moorings in Bermondsey has been adjourned until 5 July.

Residents of the barges moored near St Saviour's Dock were appealing against Southwark Council's decision at a public inquiry held at Bankside House in Sumner Street.

Residents of nearby riverside apartments

say that the 30 barges are moored illegally and have complained about noise and loss of amenity.

An adjournment was granted to let the council decide on a planning submission which would legitimise the moorings, due to be heard by the planning committee on 5 April. However, planning officers have advised councillors to reject the application.

Royal Festival Hall renovation begins this summer

THIS summer will see the beginning of the long-awaited major renovation programme in the Royal Festival Hall and its surrounding areas, bringing it into the "premier league of international arts" for the 21st century.

The original exits on all four sides of the 52-year-old building will be reopened and a new six level glass lift will be added.

The exterior will also undergo a facelift this summer in an attempt to attract new audiences. This includes the development of new retail and catering establishments alongside and overlooking the railway arches next to Festival Hall, the planting of additional trees in Festival Square and the installation of new lights to brighten the area at night.

The hall is expected to close from mid-2005 until January 2007 for restoration of the auditorium and foyer areas. An exclusive New Year event welcoming 2007 and to celebrate the reopening of the hall is being planned.

book review

The Thames: from source to sea

THE Thames: from source to sea (Collins £25) is from the growing Getmapping photographic series and shows the river from the air. It starts at the official but usually dry source in Gloucestershire and takes 140 pages to reach Southend pier. Twelve fascinating pages are devoted to SE1.

Any ambitious photographic book risks being out of date and some of SE1's development sites have progressed since the full colour digital pictures were taken. Surprisingly landmark City Hall and More London are shown under construction.

Those checking on proposed new developments such as the Potters Fields towers or Holland Street flats will find the photographic map most useful.

The curving Thames allows for a generous inland map with full coverage of Borough Market and the former coaching yards in Borough High Street. The Coin Street area is revealed as particularly green from the air.

**The Skin of Our Teeth
at the Young Vic**

THORTON Wilder's play won the Pulitzer Prize in 1942 for its depiction of the Antrobuses, an all American family, and more generally, how humankind has survived throughout the various ages (and catastrophes) of the world.

The play is in the round, with a stage made of three different platforms that can collapse on cue. The play takes place over three acts (as well as over three hours) with a cast of actors who switch in and out of character quick enough to keep the audience on its toes. By the final act, the switching from character to actor became quite frustrating.

Maureen Beattie who plays Mrs Antrobus, is nothing short of stoic as she convinces the audience that she is the glue that has held the family together thus far. David Troughton, who plays Mr Antrobus, has enormous stage presence and seems almost larger than life in his depiction of the father of all fathers.

THE café next to the back gate of Waterloo Station at the start of Lower Marsh has been the Freshly Maid and more recently the Angelo's. Now it's open again for 18 hours a day as the Waterloo Deli.

The walls are plain yellow with just one picture -the famous Lunch Atop a Skyscraper photograph taken in New York. In addition there are two televisions so everyone at the five round tables can follow the football. On warm days there are outside tables.

The menu is written up in large lettering on a giant board above the counter where you order. The new prices are good value. Jacket potatoes with cheese, egg mayonnaise or salad are just £2 each. Also on the menu are falafel with humous and salad in a pitta (£2.80) and fish and chips (£2.50). A bottle of sparkling Welsh water is 50p.

exhibition review

My name is Michael Caine

FEDERICO del Cerro's young, refreshingly modern Arch Gallery hosts an exhibition by Berlin artist Carola Gollner in tribute to one of Britain's most loved actors Michael Caine.

Gollner's artwork has centred on the iconic actor for nearly twenty years. The series, which began in 1987, demonstrates the artist's stylistic growth and changes over her career.

Early in the series, Gollner employs the German expressionist technique that gives the art an exaggerated comic-book appearance. Gollner's style fades gradually into the new pop art of the early nineties. Her more recent works indicate the return of the realistic style, which focuses on the subject apart from any role.

This exhibition casts an optimistic glow on Gollner's work. Personal favourites in the exhibit include the oil on canvas 'Specs and cigar' and, in the same medium, 'Smoke' which, incidentally, is priced at £1200.

In a matter of weeks, her shop was transformed to its current light and airy space, the dresses were on the racks and local businesses and residents were wishing her luck.

"Business has been going wonderfully well" reports Naimah. A best seller has been vividly coloured Italian tops for £24.99. There are also polka-dot skirts, Fifties style raincoats and lots of casual jackets and trousers. The Closet also sells underwear and costume jewellery. A far cry indeed from depressing news headlines and packets of cigarettes and all the better for it.

Divine Chocolate Easter Eggs

DELICIOUS Divine mini eggs – perfect for Easter egg hunts – will be on sale on Palm Sunday 4 and Easter Day 11 April from approx 12.45pm to 1.15pm at Southwark Cathedral. The regular Fair Trade stall will be stocking the milk chocolate eggs and supporting the locally based Day Chocolate Company which has its headquarters in Gainsford Street, near Tower Bridge Road. Here is the London end of the process which begins with individual cocoa growers in Ghana. Some of them joined together in 1993 to combat the fluctuations in world cocoa prices, improve standards of production and support community projects. They formed the cooperative Kuapa Kokoo, which is Twi for Good Cocoa Farmers Company. Cocoa is mainly grown on small family plots of a few hectares alongside plantain, maize and spices which protect the young plants as well as giving food and income. A big bar of Divine chocolate would be made from the two crops from one tree in one year. The fermented and dried beans are sent to Holland for roasting, crushing, winnowing and pressing to produce cocoa powder and cocoa butter. The bars are finished and sold in the mainstream £4 million a year UK chocolate market.
