Christ Church Garden

Grand re-opening this month for the green oasis in Blackfriars Road

The grand re-opening of Christ Church Garden – part of the Bankside Open Spaces scheme – falls exactly to the day on the centenary of the opening of the original garden.

This time round the garden will be opened by the Mayor of Southwark Cllr Harry Canagasabay at 12.30pm on Friday 16 June. There will be a brass band and a short overture composed by architect Marcus Beale.

There will be walks round the garden, a barbecue at the rear run by the recently refurbished Rose & Crown and a number of garden-related stalls, the

Museum of Garden History, Roots and Shoots and Walworth Garden Farm among them.

The Green Man and the Spirit of Midsummer will be in attendance on the day and an actor from Southwark Playhouse will present the raffle prizes, which have all been donated by local businesses and organisations. They include a one day course at Morley College, tickets for the Young Vic theatre and tea for two on the terrace of the House of Commons.

The garden – still in need of further funding – is the result of the combined efforts of the local community, local businesses (including Sainsbury's), the

church and the Metropolitan Gardens Association.

A real feature of the garden is the magnificent set of old plane trees which provide a welcome green space in the middle of a very busy area. Eventually it is planned to have a small play area for children and a quiet meditation space.

This is the first garden to be completed in the Bankside Open Spaces Programme to be completed. Little Dorrit Garden opens in July.

Elephant & Castle to be transformed

Southwark Council will this month select the developer who will implement the multi-million pound redevelopment of the Elephant & Castle area.

In the final stages of the council's competition to select a final partner for the development, the three shortlisted consortia (London Amsterdam/Countryside Consortium, St George Consortium and Southwark Land Regeneration plc) have now revealed their proposals for the regeneration of the 170 acre-site, including housing, transport, retail and business, open spaces and leisure.

Southwark Council leader Stephanie Elsy said: "This is an exciting time for the Elephant. We are at the beginning of a fifteen year project to transform Elephant and Castle into a place where people want

to live, work and spend leisure time."

Cathedral Ward councillor Hilary Wines added: "I hope the final partner, once selected, will bring all of their experience of working with local communities to bear on the Elephant & Castle project. It is important that everyone gains from the regeneration of the area and the consortium will be expected to work closely with local people."

The council will make a final selection of development partner on 21 June.

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Tate Modern: the SE1 residents' verdict

The gallery on Bankside attracted over 75,000 visitors over the spring bank holiday weekend – but what do the locals think?

Described by Southwark Council leader Stephanie Elsy as “a spectacular new jewel in Bankside’s crown”, Tate Modern has changed the area forever. We asked the subscribers to our email newsletter [SE1 Direct] what they thought. Here’s a selection of their responses:

James Barber:

Tate Modern is fabulous. Bright, airy and well resourced. The hype for once rings true on visiting. The views of the Globe from level 7 are a revelation. The crown of the Tate Modern jewels will be the Millennium Bridge. Selfishly I regret the loss of the area being a quite calm enclave that few knew about. The number of inconsiderate cars parked all over the area during the weekend was quite a shock. This should be less of a problem once the Southwark Street changes have taken place. The riverside seems much less intimate than in the past but the volume of visitors is so huge now that even what seemed generous before (eg Blackfriars underpass) seems stingy. The Riverside route needs upgrading along its entire length to cope with the huge numbers now using it. Bottlenecks such as Blackfriars Bridge, Westminster Bridge, Oxo Tower and the IBM building need to be resolved.

Jonathan Dudding:

Good that it is open late twice a week, it’s an amazing space, there are far too many people still and I don’t like the clumsy/cheap purple light on the top. Southwark needs to finish the walkway to London Bridge pretty quickly.

Emma S:

I visited the Tate Modern on Saturday morning – it was mobbed! Impressive building – almost too big to comprehend and absorb. Saw about two floors’ worth and then it was too busy to move so decided to wait until it has calmed down and revisit. Very exciting for the South Bank to have such a huge focus for art and culture in an area that was previously devoid of a centre of such importance. I think that we local residents could have some form of membership access – since we live within walking distance. I am considering being a member for £24 but would rather be able to join for less being a resident. Going on site has proved the dramatic change it has made to the area already – extraordinary. However, there are many challenges with the layout. Some of the most famous pieces like Monet’s *Waterlilies* and Degas’ *Dancer* are completely swamped in inappropriate locations. There were various famous or extraordinary pieces of work that were placed in corridors or hallways where there was no space to view them – eg a wonderful gigantic photograph of the Chicago stock exchange from 1999 was in a

corridor next to the escalators so it was impossible to view it adequately and appreciate it. There is wholly inadequate labelling of much of the work and the themes become irrelevant. There needs to be a bigger and better cafe/restaurant/bar that could be open when the gallery is closed possibly. Better signposting for free cloakrooms and information on the exhibitions that need tickets and what they contain -that was not clear.

Bonnie Stone:

I live and work in SE1 and went to visit the Tate today, on Monday. It was still really too crowded to be able to absorb much of what the exhibits are aiming for but still highly enjoyable. Honestly, the best thing about the new Tate is that building itself. It is so refreshing to see old buildings “recycled” and they have done a beautiful job with this building. The landscaping as well is great, they really have done a wonderful job.

Moira Comrie:

We live in SE1 – just a short walk from the Tate. Very impressed with the building conversion – have watched progress with interest. As to contents – we saw what we wanted to see – I don’t pretend to understand every exhibit – but there’s something for everyone! Wouldn’t do if we all had the same taste!

Book Review

Building Tate Modern

This coffee table book will appeal to those fascinated by the transformation of Bankside Power Station into Tate Modern. Described as “the book of the building”, *Building Tate Modern* by the *Evening Standard*’s Rowan Moore and Raymund Ryan of the Dublin School of Architecture (Tate Gallery Publishing, £25) is lavishly illustrated and elegantly presented. It boasts an exclusive interview with architect Jacques Herzog and Tate director Nicholas Serota. There are contributions by the Adrian Hardwicke and Gavin Stamp, who provides a chapter on *Giles Gilbert Scott and Bankside Power Station*, while the *Transformation* chapter deals places the Tate in the context of Bankside’s regeneration process.

Sir John Gielgud 1904-2000

Sir John Gielgud, who has died at the age of 96, made his first stage appearance in 1921 at the Old Vic playing the English herald in Shakespeare's *Henry V*. In 1929, when *The Cut* was still a late night market area, he returned to join Lilian Baylis's company and after three years in Waterloo had made his lasting reputation. No actor has since taken on so many leading Shakespeare roles. In 1940 he was back at the Old Vic playing Lear to an audience which included soldiers on leave. In 1974, when Peter Hall caused controversy with a production of *The Tempest*, Gielgud played Prospero.

Blade of Light at the Oxo Tower

One of the two Official Millennium Bridge exhibitions this month can be found at the gallery@oxo. Atmospheric black and white photographs by Julian Anderson provide a valuable record of the bridge's construction. There is also a corner devoted to Bridge-related work by pupils of Charles Dickens School. Mock-ups of the balustrade and handrail as well as the steel cable that supports the bridge can be seen along with Norman Foster's early sketches and more detailed architectural plans. 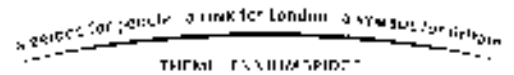
